Personal pronouns are words used instead of the names of people or things. They help a writer to keep their writing concise. The words also give information about the number (singular or plural), gender, and person (who is speaking).

The following table includes all singular and plural personal pronouns.

2nd person	You/your/yours/yourself	you/ your/ yourselves
3rd person	He/him/ his She/her/ hers It/its	They/ them/ their/ theirs
