

# What Is Simple Past Tense?

The **simple past tense** is used to describe an activity that happened in the past. In other words, it started in the past and ended in the past.

## Examples:

- *John baked a cake.*
- *She danced at her wedding.*

The simple past tense can also be used to talk about a past state of being, such as the way someone felt about something. This is often expressed with the simple past tense of the verb “to be” and an adjective, a noun, or a prepositional phrase.

## Examples:

- I was proud of my son at the sports day event.
- I was upset about my grades.

## Ways to form the simple past tense

For most verbs, the past tense can be formed by adding “-d,” “-ed,” or “-t” to the root form of the verb.

## Examples:

- *Play - played*
- *Love - loved*

The simple past tense of some irregular verbs are written exactly like the root form.

## Examples:

- *Put - put*
- *Cut - cut*
- *Set - set*
- *Cost - cost*
- *Hit - hit*
- *Let - let*

For some verbs, the simple past tense is quite different:

#### Examples:

- See - saw
- Win - won
- Build - built
- Do - did
- Go - went
- Rise - rose
- am/is/are - was/were
- Give - gave
- Bring - brought
- Catch - caught
- Understand - understood
- Come - came
- Begin - began
- Break - broke
- Buy - bought
- Choose - chose
- Come - came
- Draw - drew
- Drive - drove
- Eat - ate
- Feel - felt
- Find - found
- Get - got
- Give - gave
- Have - had
- Hold - held
- Keep - kept
- Know - knew
- Leave - left
- Lead - led
- Lie - lay
- Lose - lost
- Make - made
- Mean - meant
- Meet - met
- Pay - paid
- Run - ran
- Say - said
- Sell - sold
- Send - sent
- Sit - sat
- Speak - spoke
- Spend - spent
- Stand - stood
- Take - took
- Teach - taught
- Tell - told
- Wear - wore
- Write - wrote

## How to form a negative statement in the simple past tense

If you need to make a negative statement in the past tense, you can use the following word order:

**"did not" + base form of the verb**

#### Examples:

- Mary did not use the GPS to reach the venue.
- The plane did not land on the runway.

## How to form an interrogative statement in the past tense

If you need to ask a question, you can use the following word order for a yes/no question:

**"did" + [subject] + base form of verb**

#### Examples:

- *Did Mary use GPS to reach the venue?*
- *Did the plane land on the runway?*

You can use the following word order for a choice question:

**"did" + [subject] + base form of the verb + choice A + or + choice B**

#### Examples:

- Did Mary use the GPS or the paper map to reach the venue?
- Did the plane land on the runway 1 or runway 2?
